This year Memory Care Home Solutions is thrilled to announce that we have served 66,850 people since the start of the organization in 2002. You can see the trajectory grow as we have served 22,000 of those in the last program year alone.

## It's about Caregivers.

Our family caregivers are comprised of the spouses, children, siblings, friends or neighbors who valiantly take on the role of helping care for someone whose cognitive abilities are in decline. Whether they bring over a casserole, drive to the grocery store or accompany them to a doctor's appointment, they are part of the caregiving team, and we are there to help them. The testimonials from caregivers we receive include such phrases as, "you are a godsend," "We are so glad we found you," and "What would we have done without you?" It warms our hearts to hear such feedback. The fact is that there are many, many families who are still caregiving without us, but thanks to wonderful funding, our program is expanding in its breadth and depth to reach them where they are.



## It's about Being of Value.

**Community** Recently, Memory Care garnered increased community support, which allowed our program staff to triple since 2013. Through the support of the Missouri Foundation for Health and the Retirement Research Foundation, among others, Memory Care Home Solutions took our caregiving training programs to the next level and served more than 300 families, offering each up to four occupational therapy visits. That means our families are receiving hands-on training in the most basic and important activities of their life.

Caregivers are learning how to bathe, transfer, assist with personal hygiene and simply know how to talk to someone with cognitive impairment through Memory Care's programs. With the support of our community, we now offer classes and appear at corporate trade shows and health fairs, which expands the awareness of what we offer. Throughout the last year, we appeared at RGA, Watlow, BJC and Wells Fargo Advisors. Our partnerships reach 85 counties across Missouri and in Illinois. Thanks to our wonderful funders, our services are offered free of charge. **Results** Memory Care Home Solutions was awarded additional funding from the Missouri Legislature of approximately \$100,000 to be paid in FY2015 that will allow us to expand our reach and our programming even farther. The state identified MCHS for the support, due to our key positioning, the fact that our results prove to reduce long-term healthcare costs for the State of Missouri and a timely increase in state general revenue.

**Quality** The impact of our program cannot be understated. We continue to track the reduction of healthcare costs, showing marked reduction of 911 calls, ER visits and length of stay at hospitals. Beyond that, now with our expanded occupational therapy visit offering, we are able to show that in the last program year:

- 82% of caregivers benefited from communication and disruptive behavior training
- 97% of male caregivers benefit from perineal care and toileting training
- 67% of caregivers benefit from training on medication management

The list goes on and on. We are so thankful that we have been able to maintain quality services free of charge to every concerned caregiver who calls us – regardless of diagnosis, financial status or geography. Caregivers are now being helped nationwide through the sale of our "Memory Care Guidebook", the dedicated professionals who staff our geriatric phone line and the resources available at our new web site.

So when the day may seem dark and fruitless, Memory Care Home Solutions is here to offer hope.



The Story of Joan Mable



# When Joan, a retired school teacher of 40 years, began caring for her mother with Alzheimer's, she was doing it completely on her own.

It wasn't until she was referred to Memory Care Home Solutions' programs for caregivers of loved ones with dementia that she has truly been able to balance her personal time with the responsibilities of caring for her mother.

"Memory Care has helped me the most because they provided me with real strategies caregivers use to help their loved one with

memory loss and still have time to do things they enjoy," said Joan. "I try to do as much for myself as I can because it keeps me positive and calm."

Joan's mother, Mable. suffered from a stroke five vears ago and moved in with Joan after the symptoms of her Alzheimer's While worsened. Mable's memory continuing is decline, to the 93-year-old is still healthy and enjoys going to church, spending time with family and being social. Joan does



not want to move her into a nursing home, as she's still mobile and enjoyable to be around. However, it is common for persons with cognitive impairments to become anxious and agitated if their caregiver is not directly in their line of sight. This makes it difficult for caregivers to accomplish their own daily activities.

Joan has seen this first-hand and says the most challenging part of her caregiving situation is her mother's compulsive tendencies. Mable often repeats questions throughout the day or becomes fixated on topics or concerns for long periods of time. Mable also tends to follow Joan around throughout the house, making everyday tasks more challenging for Joan to complete.

Jan Hanneke, a social worker for Memory Care, and Shelia Lynch, an occupational therapist, made multiple visits to Joan's home to assess her situation and provide individualized

> recommendations for how to improve Joan and Mable's routines.

> "During our initial noticed visit. we Mable needed a lot of reassurance from Joan; Mable was always right by her side. It was difficult for Joan to focus on a task while in the same room as her mother," said Jan, who provided the initial in-home consultation for Joan and Mable. "When we gave Mable an art activity to focus on, Joan was ecstatic because she could check the mail without any interruptions. It's the little things we take for granted, like

quickly sorting the mail, that become difficult as a caregiver."

Managing the time commitments and financial responsibilities of caregiving takes patience and understanding. Memory Care's programs aim to ease the stress of caregivers as much as possible. After the initial in-home consultation, Memory Care works with the caregiver to identify three or four main priorities to accomplish during four additional visits, ranging from communication support to advice on personal care.

Provídíng Support

When a loved one begins to show the signs of memory loss, dementia or Alzheimer's disease, families – everyday heroes – put it all aside to do the best job they can.

Memory Care Home Solutions has served, supported and connected with many of these incredible caregivers since the organization was founded.

Sandra, a caregiver of both her sister and mother, two beautiful women with Alzheimer's disease, made a comment that we cannot seem to forget, **"Co-workers, friends, family – they don't understand what you go through as a caregiver – but the program director from Memory Care Home Solutions was on top of all those things – their staff met the needs before I even knew they were there."** Memory Care Home Solutions brings this peace to thousands of caregivers every year. Last year in the United States – 15.5 million family members and friends provided over 17.7 billion hours of unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.

## The Story of Joan & Mable



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"The puzzles and photo albums Memory Care Home Solutions gave us have really made a difference. They distract her and give me time to breathe," said Joan. "I'm so blessed to have these resources."

Memory Care Home Solutions offers a variety of programs at no cost to family caregivers. The most customized program is the in-home family training and consultation program. Families receive an average of 12 hours of one-on-one support from social work and occupational therapy clinicians over the course of a year. Memory Care Home Solutions also offers free, interactive caregiving workshops to community groups and telephone-based dementia care counseling for caregivers to call whenever they need support or advice. "I try to do as much for myself as I can because it keeps me positive and calm."




